
The eMEMBERSHIP SEMINAR!

Air Space Educator Cohort Summer Experiences

I, Carolyn Bushman, am excited to write about my experiences with NASA this summer. During Christmas break, I submitted two experiment proposals to fly experiments on a NASA hot air balloon and Orion Rocket. Both experiments were selected. Six of my students could fly to Wallops Flight Facility to participate in activities. Due to budget cuts, funding was unavailable. This meant that I had to raise \$6,000 for the trip to happen. I was determined to raise the needed money. Thanks to the following people, the trip did happen: ATK Launching Systems, Princess Timpanogos DAR Chapter, Mary Alice Brinley, Goshute Indian Tribe and Beehive Telephone. This experience taught me the importance of having a dream, working hard toward it, and never giving up.

The first trip occurred in March. The students had the opportunity to package our thermometer experiment for the NASA hot air balloon slated to fly July 24. The hot air balloon is bigger than the Washington Monument.

We toured the rocket making facility, control room, and weather balloon launch area. The next day they were the controllers of a weather balloon launch. I had chills going up my back as my student said ten, nine, eight... and my other student could say go or no go. Wow, what an experience.

We ended the trip by taking the boys to Washington DC. My students had no idea how big the Washington Monument was. They thought that it would be about the size of the weather balloon. Well the look on my students' faces when they saw the monument was amazing. Two of my students expressed a desire to become engineers after the trip.

In June, the second trip to Wallops occurred. One student, Crystal Henroid, is a 7th grader who is in special education. I was thrilled watching her participate. We had the opportunity to see the rocket on the launch pad up close and see the rocket launch and retrieve our experiment. Space Camp was my next adventure. I got to do a simulation of a shuttle launch and return to Earth. I had the chance to get on some equipment that they use to train astronauts. The 1/5 gravity allowed me to feel like I was walking on the moon. It was not as easy as it looks.

I was selected as one of twenty educators from across the country to be air space education cohorts. Training took place at the NASA Ames Research Center.

I was able to see the world's largest wind tunnels. It takes enough electricity that could run the whole Bay Area to start up the wind tunnel. We had the opportunity to see the vertical and horizontal simulator. This simulator is used to train the military helicopter, space shuttle, and lunar landing pilots. As we were leaving the simulator building, former Astronaut Karol J Bobko held the door for us. This was very special for me as he came to my school earlier this year and it was good to see him again. Astronaut Bobko was the commander when Senator Garn went into space.

My favorite tour was the future flight. They bring in controllers to model how effective an airport or a design of an airport is. The controllers say it is like the real thing. The images are in 3D. Within 10 years there will be over three times as many planes in the air as there are now. The computers that run the simulation fill a large room. It was incredible to watch all the planes land and take off and to realize that over 45 of the terminals we were seeing had yet to be built.

Last, we got to see panorama pictures from the Mars Rovers. Wow! I also got to tour the robot area and see the robots that they are planning to replace the rovers with someday on Mars and to walk beside our astronauts on the moon.

NASA has developed educational curriculum to be used in the classroom based on the real life uses of math and science. This allows everyone to benefit.

I would like to thank the Utah DAR daughters for your support. I love to share my experiences with you. Thanks for allowing me to visit your chapters. Please let me know if I can do anything for your chapter.

I feel incredibly blessed to have had these opportunities.


