First on Color Country Chapter's (CCC) list is a huge "Thank You" to our very own Diane Tarbox, CCC's Organizing Regent and Honorary State Regent for her hard work, along with Brenda Reeder, Regent of Uintah Chapter for organizing and hosting a wonderful DAR Genealogy Workshop at the Family History Library in August. The proceeds of the workshop were shared between CCC and Uintah Chapter. Thank you! Additional appreciation is extended to Brenda Reeder for traveling to St. George to teach CCC about new DAR software, submitting and documenting applications and supplementals, and new sources of service.

After a busy summer of successful fund raising, Color Country Chapter donated \$2000 to the soon-to-bebuilt Ivan's Veterans' Home. Just before our September meeting we learned CCC won "Most Patriotic" for our entry in the City's Fourth of July Parade. We began our September meeting with a potluck luncheon hosted by chapter officers and committee chairs, and realized our chapter had outgrown our meeting place. In remembrance of 9/11, CCC presented the St. George City Fire Department with a DAR "We Remember Flag" and placed flowers at the Veterans' Memorial at Tonaquint Cemetery. In addition, we had five Constitution Week displays and a display in a local library honoring our military, past and present, including the then recently deployed 222nd of the Utah National Guard.

In October, CCC welcomed Utah State Regent, Cindy Toone, her mother, Janis McCoid, Honorary State Regent, and Emily Toone. Along with several chapter members we gathered at Tonaquint Nature Center to plant a tree, then on to lunch and then to our meeting. It was a long, but very enjoyable day. In November, we remembered and honored our veterans by placing a wreath at the Veterans' Memorial at Tonaguint Cemetery and presenting our local "Flag Man" and Pearl Harbor Survivor, Lee Richard Warren with the NSDAR Ellen Hardin Walworth Medal for Patriotism. In recognition of DAR's Women to Women CCC has shipped over \$1300 worth of supplies to Afghanistan and Iraq and sent \$230 for phone cards for our wounded military in Landstuhl Hospital in Germany. Three churches in St. George joined with CCC in our efforts to support our deployed women in military service and provided much of the requested items and funds for shipping costs.

Probably the program that has been most meaningful to all CCC members was our Christmas Luncheon honoring our six local Pearl Harbor Survivors. Lu Fischer began work on the luncheon in mid-summer and didn't stop until December 6th the day of the luncheon. All six survivors and a guest were invited to attend. Of the six, only two were able to join us as most are in frail health. They were presented with leis and

flags from their branch of the service. All attending were impressed with the music provided by Snow Canyon Middle School Choir. One of our newest members, Ellen Schunk, was instrumental in obtaining beautiful certificates from US Senator Mike Lee's office for each survivor thanking them for their service to our country. After the luncheon, she personally presented the certificates to those unable to attend. One survivor was hospitalized with his family gathered in his room as she presented his certificate to him. He thanked her and said he had never had anything like that happen before in his life. Sadly, he died the following day.

In January, Dixie Miller gave a wonderful program on Juliette Gordon Low Founder of Girl Scouts of the USA and shared with us her extensive collection of Girl Scout memorabilia. In February, we had a wonderful opportunity to see the training our local JROTC Cadets are receiving, as four cadets were present at the beginning of our meeting to Present the Colors. It was very impressive to see them in full uniform, demonstrating their patriotism with their dedication to presenting our beautiful American Flag with exactness and honor. Heartfelt thanks to the JROTC Cadets from Dixie High School. Our February program continued with a very information program on "Heart Healthy Eating for Women," presented by a registered dietitian from Dixie Regional Medical Center.

Jenny is a graduate of American University in Washington, D.C. and is spending a second year in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) at the King Saud University.

Jenny writes: "I learned through experience that Saudi is about as diametrically opposed to America as it is possible to be, except for two key things, Patriotism and piety. The Saudis are incredibly proud to be Saudi. And they are obviously religious. And the main difference there is in the importance we place on separation of church (or mosque) and state.

There are so many elements of the DAR's creed that I would love to share with my girls. Unfortunately, these precious ideas are those which are prohibited: freedom of person, thought, expression, ideas and personality. The women of the DAR have been vital to the ongoing success of the United States' defenses, economy and patriotism. Their tenacity and their perseverance in face of adversity have proven a boon for our country, and I went to Saudi Arabia wanting to impact those values. I came away slightly shammed, because the women of Saudi Arabia already know tenacity. They know survival. And they know how to survive in the face of adversity.

Don't pity them, but stand in solidarity with them, as we have stood together to support our nation. Lend your strength and support so they, and other voiceless women around the world, might be accorded the respect we a mothers, sister, aunts, nieces, daughters, and most importantly, women unconditionally deserve.

I write this as I sit in the /Chicago International Airport, waiting for my flight back to Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates and on to Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. I am returning for a second year, to continue my student's and y international education. I'm proud to be an American, and I hope that I might be an ambassador of all that is great about our fine country to all those I encounter abroad. God Bless America! Best, Jenny Sparks".

#### Princess Timpanogos – Frances Merrill, Regent

Princess Timpanogos Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Sept. had Sgt. Chevonne Day, a female soldier from the Utah National Guard, who has served our country on active duty for 10 years in the US Army. She had recently returned from duty in Iraq. She shared her experiences about her military service with our group with a power point presentation

of actual photos taken in that country, and explained needs of women in the military. Her husband accompanied her presentation and a highlight was the fact that they met while both were serving in Iraq, and were married in Iraq. Isn't that romantic?

Dawn Merrill presented a power point program of artwork found in military chapels in the USA. This artwork is mostly stained glass. Because these chapels are non- denominational in purpose, the military interpretations on the scriptures that accompanied most of the images were different because the images pictured a military person in uniform within the stained glass. It is believed that the general public has not been exposed to this artwork because of not living near a military base, or challenges getting onto a military base. Dawn has been sharing this presentation to different groups in the SL Valley.

A DAR National Community Service Award and pin was given to Lily Gaitin, a Mexican woman, for her work helping her Catholic Church for many years. She has been spending each Sat. making sandwiches and lunches to be distributed to the homeless on Sunday. She has done other remarkable service to her church over the years. The Regional Catholic newspaper, (dispersed throughout the intermountain area) featured on the front page of their paper a large article & picture, (1/2 page) featuring her receiving this DAR award. The Valley Journal had a picture and article of her receiving this award also. (Good press for the DAR).

Our group this year began meeting at Murray City Library which is totally handicapped equipped with good parking and all the amenities (flag, piano, public address system, large tables, chairs etc. We are pleased with this accommodation.

In October, our group toured the "U of U" library which has been recently upgraded and some remodels. This was a very interesting guided tour. Princess Timpanogos Chapter has their histories housed in this facility in their Special Collections area, and our group was able to see some of the old DAR minutes, pictures etc.

Before we started the tour we presented a DAR National Community Service Award to a Scouter that has worked many years helping boys in the scouting program. He received the DAR pin and wears it proudly on the collar of his Boy Scout uniform. The Utah State Boy Scout Council featured this event with his picture in uniform on the front page of their monthly newsletter in color. (Good press for the DAR.) The month of October found us celebrating and learning about the history of Veteran's Day with a power point program given by Darle Taylor, our Chairman of Service for Veterans. We donated 43 cards to the VA

Hospital for homeless Veterans for food at various eating establishments around the SLC area. We also had a test of sorts about the numbers of veterans who have served and are still living from the various wars and conflicts. Several won very nice prizes. October also found two of our members, 1st Vice Regent, Dorothy Williams and Regent, Vickie Fuller in Montana to the field training for genealogy. We had fun, met many new friends and have a better idea of how and where to find information for new member applications and supplemental papers.

November saw us gain a goodly amount from our Boutique to augment our budget for the coming year. Our program was a lively Living History Group who came dressed in the uniforms of the Maryland Militia during the Revolutionary War. They explained their uniforms, field gear, muskets and battles. They were great fun and we learned many things about the men who fought the War of Independence. In November, our chapter planted two trees along with State Regent, Cindy Toone, at Murray City Park. The day was beautiful, those attending from our chapter were many and the Red Leaf English Oak and the Suzanna Lily Magnolia were beautiful and complemented the lovely day!

In November our chapter collected personal items for the Peace House in Park City; a facility that offers shelter to abused and battered women and children. The items included curling irons, hair dryers, hot rollers, and clothing of all sizes, shoes, hair and make-up products, personal hygiene articles. The total value was \$600.00. We were fortunate to have received a tour of this lovely housing shelter in Park City. We also donated 118 children's books to the Peoples Health Care Clinic in Park City. This facility serves those children and adults who have no insurance and need both health and dental care. The Clinic gives a children's book to every child who receives any kind of service in their clinic.

We as a chapter also donated 600 children's books, many signed by the authors, to LaPetite for the reading enjoyment of young readers. We also collected and donated 1,100 books to the Utah State Prison Library System. Our prison system has several libraries but no budget for the purchase of books. They were most grateful for the donation.

As you may have guessed our chapter is heavily involved in literacy in our communities from providing books to tutoring in the schools in our neighborhoods. Our DAR Society has been visible and well represented by our chapter in programs involving patriotism, conservation, literacy, veterans and community outreach.

Wreaths Across America Ceremony at the Military Cemetery at Camp Williams ushered in December. Three of our members attended including

Olive O'Mara our 92-year-old member who is a Veteran Wave of WWII. Also attending were Tani Smihula and Regent, Vickie Fuller. Because the day was cool, with no snow we hurriedly put 315 wreaths on the graves of our soldiers buried at the Veteran's Cemetery here in the SLC area. Olive and Vickie then hurried down to the Lion House in downtown Salt Lake to attend the State Officers Christmas Party where we met several other member of our chapter for an early Christmas celebration; complete with beautiful music and a wonderful story called "A Revolutionary Christmas Story" by Lynne Cheney which was published in The New York Times. We then sang several Christmas carols, which concluded a perfect day.

In December four of our members, Pat Fullerton, Connie Lockhart, Cheryl Thomson and Vickie Fuller delivered many personal items to the House of Hope, in Park City, which was our community outreach service project. This house is a haven for abused women and children.

January found our chapter renewed and ready to start the New Year. Our American Indian chairmen, Hazel Peterson and junior member, Lauren Peterson enlightened us on much of the folklore, pottery techniques and culture of our Western Indian tribes. Princess Timpanogos Regent, Frances Merrill and her daughter came and presented a program on the Stained Glass Windows found in the post chapels on our military bases around the County. The stained glass pictures were breath taking and we saw the military viewpoint of several of the avenging angels.

All in all I would say we have had a great time in DAR!

Upon entering the chapel, we were greeted by Patriot Guard members standing as sentries holding flags. Sterling Poulsen served as master of ceremonies and speaker. Mr. Poulsen recently retired from the Air Force after 27 years of service and is well-known to Utah residents as the Chief Meteorologist for KUTV 2 News.

#### **Protocol Reminders**

- 1. When addressing the chair, address the chair only, Madame State Regent. There is only one Presiding Officer.
- 2. It is the custom to remove the glove from the right hand before placing the hand over the heart while reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and while singing The National Anthem.
- 3. Do not place the hand over the heart while reciting The American's Creed.
- 4. The Flag Pin should be worn on the left lapel, in accordance with the United States Flag Code.
- 5. When wearing the DAR Insignia, the Flag Pin is the only emblem that may be worn on the left and should be worn on the left lapel and not on the official ribbon.
- 6. Members should rise when the President General and the State Regent are presented and also at the entrance of the processional.
- 7. If the President of the United States or the Governor of the State is present, the audience should rise when he/she is introduced or when communications from the President or the Governor are read.
- 8. Members should also rise during the reading of an official greeting from the President General to a state conference, but it is not customary to stand when the President General's message from the Daughters newsletter is read at a chapter meeting.
