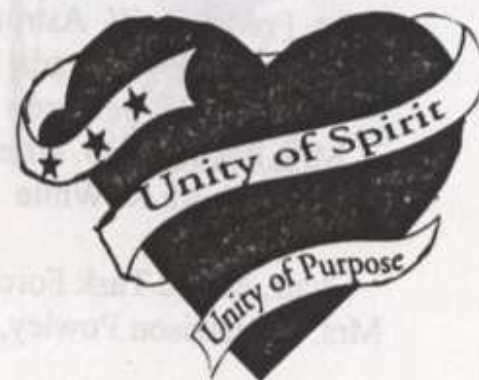

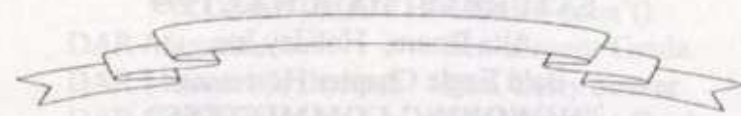

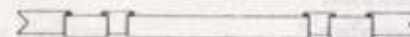

RECESS FOR LUNCHEON

STANDING RULES

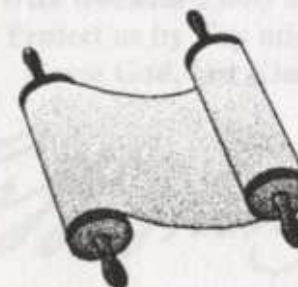

The most dramatic rescue operation of the 20th century was the Berlin Airlift-- a remarkable mission that saved more than 2.5 million people from starvation and served as the single most significant event in stopping the Soviet advance across post-World War II Europe.

The Berlin Airlift marked a time of great glory for the United States and its Western Allies during the early days of the Cold War. The Russian blockade-- an attempt by Stalin to wrest control of Berlin and continue communist expansion across Europe-- began on June 24, 1948, and remained in effect until May 12, 1949.

For 10 days, tension had been growing between the Soviets and the Western Allies over access to Berlin. The Soviets halted first auto, then

barge, finally all railroad traffic into the city, sealing off the western portion of Berlin controlled by American, British and French forces. In response, the Western Allies took to the skies and began flying in provisions for West Berlin's 2.2 million residents, an effort that grew into the Berlin Airlift.

Without the airlift, it was calculated that the western sectors of Berlin had only enough food and fuel stockpiled to last a month. Unwilling to ignore the blockade and relinquish their portions of the city to the Soviets, the Allies decided on an unprecedented solution. Soon, both the American and British military were recruiting pilots from as far away as the Pacific Islands, Alaska and Hawaii to fly in supplies. By the mission's end, 342 planes had made 277,000 flights carrying 2.5 million tons of necessities into Berlin.

During the Soviet blockade American and British aircraft supplied the inhabitants of Berlin with all food, fuel, industrial goods and raw materials. Supply deliveries grew from 500-700 tons a day in June 1948 to 12,940 tons by April 1949.

Among the most eagerly anticipated provisions brought in were the bundles of candy for the city's children. "Operation Little Vittles" started after American flier, Lt. Gail S. Halvorsen, encountered a group of children near the airport. Touched by their gratitude for his gift of a couple of sticks of gum, he promised more candy on his next trip, telling them to watch for the plane that would "wiggle" its wings once. Lt. Halvorsen kept his promise by dropping candy wrapped in handkerchief parachutes the next day. His kindness earned him the nickname "Uncle Wiggle Wings" and news accounts of the deed caught the imagination of school children across America. As a result, American children began collecting candy and hundreds of handkerchiefs and other pieces of scrap cloth to make parachutes for the children of Berlin.

At midnight on May 12, 1949, the Soviets reopened land and water routes into Berlin ending the 322-day blockade of Berlin. However, airlift missions continued for several months building up supplies.
