

The Sego Lily chapter stepped up to State Regent Susan Holt's call to serve local schools in a couple of ways this year. In September, Belinda Barking, a chapter member who serves as State Librarian and Women's Issues State Chair, began such a capstone project for the New Horizons Course. She led a drive to prepare pantry packs for the Bountiful Food Pantry's Principal's Pantry effort. The Bountiful Food Pantry supports South Davis County schools with gallon bags of ready-to-eat and microwavable meals for children to use on weekends when free and reduced meals from school are not available. The chapter made up many packs and had extra food to donate to the pantry.

Another way the Sego Lily Daughters supported area students was by donating school supplies to Davis Education Foundation's Child Spree event. Child Spree is an annual event which provides more than 250 students with new clothing and essentials to start the school year. Each child receives a one-on-one shopping experience at an area department store and a gift card to spend to prepare them for the school year. According to the Foundation, about 1100 students in the district are homeless, and school principals select K-6 students who have the greatest need to attend Child Spree. With membership drawing from mostly Davis and Weber Counties, the Sego Lily chapter collected dozens of school supplies to give Child Spree a jumpstart for the event which will take place in August. Stacey Richards organized the school supply drive, and items were collected over several months earlier this year.

The NSDAR is known for honoring service men and women, past and present. In addition to participating in the rededication of the World War I Doughboy monument in Ogden and other activities honoring veterans, the

Sego Lily chapter had the unique opportunity to hear from Utah native Erik Pearson, who served in the elite 3rd United States Infantry Regiment of the United States Army, (a.k.a. The Old Guard). The regiment is the oldest active duty regiment in the US Army, and was first organized in 1784. It is the official ceremonial unit and escort to the president, and it also provides security for Washington, D.C., in time of national emergency or civil disturbance.

Pearson recounted his fascinating journey to become one of the oldest guards to ever serve at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery. He shared traditions and experiences and assignments from his service there, among them driver for VIP motorcades and serving in the Honor Guard for funerals in Arlington National Cemetery and dignified transfers of fallen soldiers returning to the United States at Dover Air Force Base.

128th Continental Congress Recap SUSAN H. HOLT, UTAH STATE REGENT USSDAR


